Defying the Nazis and the French government that was collaborating with the Nazis, the inhabitants of the small protestant village of Le Chambon-sur-Lignon provided a safe haven throughout the war for whoever knocked on their door. Led by their pastor, Andre Trocme, the villagers, most of them descendants of Huguenots, helped save the lives of nearly 5,000 Jewish people.
